It was nice that he took a lot of time for us because we stayed at the winery for around two hours and it was never boring.

I really enjoyed that we were allowed to taste the "Riesling Trockenbeerenauslese". Another aspect I liked was that they mentioned the word "hand-harvested" on the labels. The only negative things were that the wine tasting was in German and I had to translate to the others and that during our tasting there were also other guests there



For our second visit we chose the winery Proidl in Senftenberg (Kremstal) which is also not that far away from Krems. Due to the reason that they still have a lot of work to do in the cellar we "just" got a tasting. But therefore it was an amazing tasting because we were allowed to taste every wine we wanted from their wine list. So, in total we tasted 14 wines including their most expensive ones. (e.g. Erste Lage wines; Riesling TBA). The best thing in the end was that instead of paying for the bottles we wanted to buy we got them for free!

For me the most important thing for the perfect winery visit would be the atmosphere. I like it when you feel welcomed. This also includes friendly and prepared people. I personally like it more when there is a little tour through the winery and the cellar with explanations that you have a good impression of the whole winery before you have the tasting of the wines. During the tasting I would enjoy recommendations about what is best to try first from the winegrower but also that you can choose by yourself some bottles you want to taste. For the tasting I think it is important that you also get enough explanations about the wines with maybe also some information folders. For me it would not matter if they charge 2-5 € for the tasting but then I think I would not buy wine additionally. If the tasting would be for free, of course you feel more forced to buy a wine but in the end it is your decision if you want to buy a bottle or not.
